AIMS

IT IS OUR AIM TO MAKE LOCAL PEOPLE ACTIVE PRIMARILY BY TAKING LOCAL CHILDREN ON A JOURNEY FROM INVOLVEMENT IN OUR COMMUNITY PROJECTS TO BECOME FULL TIME MEMBERS OF LOCAL SPORTS CLUBS.

THE YOUTH SPORTS TRUST FINDINGS OUTLINE THE LINK BETWEEN PHYSICAL ACTIVITY IN CHILDREN AND ACADEMIC SUCCESS.

- 1. PHYSICALLY ACTIVE CHILDREN ACHIEVE HIGHER LEVELS OF ACADEMIC ATTAINMENT THAN THEIR LESS PHYSICALLY ACTIVE PEERS.
- 2. PHYSICAL ACTIVITY MEANS THAT CHILDREN ARE BETTER ABLE TO CONCENTRATE, WHICH CAN ENHANCE LEARNING.
- 3. PHYSICAL ACTIVITY SUPPORTS BETTER HEALTH AND WELL BEING AMONG YOUNG PEOPLE, WHICH IN TURN MEANS THEY ARE MORE LIKELY TO ACHIEVE BETTER ACADEMICALLY.
- 4. PHYSICAL ACTIVITY CAN ENHANCE THE COGNITIVE HEALTH OF YOUNG PEOPLE TO SUPPORT EFFECTIVE LEARNING.
- 5. PHYSICAL LITERACY CAN SUPPORT SCHOOL READINESS.
- 6. ORGANISED SPORTS AND AFTER-SCHOOL CLUBS ARE ASSOCIATED WITH HIGHER LEVELS OF ATTAINMENT.



IMPACT STATEMENT

My name is Julie Marks I have 25 years experience working with families and children. I work at NCPS and have worked as part of the HAF programme in Newington and Ursuline College.

The change in the children has been amazing, there confidence and

self-esteem grow as the days went on. Some children started by not wanting to engage but with some encouragement joined in and after a few days had no issues coming in and saying goodbye to parents/grandparents.

Not only did the children's confidence and self-esteem grow but the opportunity to try the different activities is something the children wouldn't otherwise of had. The HAF programme also kept are most vulnerable children of the streets safe and fed.

Parents continually said the HAF programme was a blessing as it kept their children safe and occupied half terms as it is a financial struggle especially holidays. We also had a lot of SEN children this time round and after they got to know the staff they came in the doors and had fun. Some needed ear protectors which helped them with the noise.

It was lovely to see their faces beam with excitement at some of the activities. Greeting the parents in the morning and at the end of the day gave me the opportunity to signpost some parents who were struggling to deal with their children's behaviour at home and give them some advice. I believe the HAF programme is something that is needed to keep are most vulnerable children safe happy and fed.





IMPACT STATEMENT

I have noticed a significant improvement in the confidence of the children who were on the HAF programme.

They have been shown skills they may not have, experienced things they may only ever watch on the TV and it means that the children are still in touch with adults through the holiday so coming back to school is not so daunting for the children, when it normally is.

Those children now have something to talk about, something to share about their holidays and an adventure story to tell! The children have been able to form bonds with adults which has then meant they have someone to talk to and someone to share any worries with when they come back.

I think HAF at Newington has had a huge impact on the children who attended through the holidays and think it would be only right for the scheme to continue.

Jamie Hewitt worked with us at Broadstairs College before moving into one of our school placements and is now full time with a local sports coaching company

TJ has grown into one of the areas most popular players. He has also moved from our school placements onto running his own sports coaching franchise

Leo and his Dad Pat started attending our earliest haf programmes. Leo is now the centre forward for one of our teams coached by his Dad!

Vinny regularly attends our HAF programmes and his Dad Charlie is disabled. He states that it's a huge opportunity for Vinny to be active. Furthermore they don't have internet at home so the lap top and mobile internet access has made it far easier for Vinny to do his homework

Tracey works on our haf programmes and her son Joseph attends them and plays for our youth section. Joseph regularly attends our first team matches and is one of the children who learnt to ride a bike on our Easter programme

Many of the children who flew on helicopter flights during our summer 2023 programme had never been on a plane before. One of the primary school aged grls said "Her favourite thing was seeing everything in the world that she had never seen before"

Rupert is a primary school aged lad who is dignosed with autism. His Mum states that he rarely attends any after school activities but has attended every one of our haf programmes. He also watches all of our first team matches and attends our Thursday evening SEN session. Rupert third place cert from the "floor is lava" competition is a prized possession of his

Parents have enrolled on East Kent College courses as a result of their presence at our community programmes. Including youth team player Jake's Mum Sally who is learning how to carry out MOT's

Gabriel Clarke and Mike Bushall brought the BBC and ITV cameras to film at the club and shine the light on our Town in Dec 23 as a result of our FA Cup exploits

The FA cup visited Thanet Schools for local children to be pictured with ahead of our second round match v league 2 AFC Wimbledon

Chloe Watts. First team ladies manager, teacher on our haf programmes and role model to the 150 plus girls in our youth section

We have teams at every age group ranging from tiny tots, u7-u23 and including over 35, over 45 and walking football sides
